Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN)

- + Dedicated to keeping the Internet **secure**, **stable** and **interoperable**
- + Coordinates the Internet's **unique identifiers**
- + Follows **consensus-driven multi-stakeholder model**
- + Formed in 1998 as a **not-for-profit** public-benefit corporation
- + Hub offices in **Los Angeles, Istanbul, Singapore** and engagement offices globally

The program in brief...

- One of ICANN's key responsibilities is introducing and promoting competition in the registration of domain names
- In 2005 - 2007, GNSO began a PDP to consider the introduction of new gTLDs, based on the results of trial rounds conducted in 2000 - 2003
- In 2008, the ICANN Board adopted 19 specific GNSO policy recommendations for implementing new gTLDs.

Continued...

- After approval of the policy, ICANN undertook an open, inclusive, and transparent implementation process to address various stakeholder concerns leading to multiple draft versions of the Applicant Guidebook.
- In June 2011, ICANN's Board of Directors approved the Guidebook and authorized the launch of the New gTLD Program
- The application window opened on January - April 2012

History



The Applicant Guidebook has gone through several iterations in draft form and is the result of years of careful implementation of GNSO policy recommendations and thoughtful review and feedback from the ICANN stakeholder community. Each version of the Applicant Guidebook was posted for public comment. More than one thousand public comments have been reviewed and considered, making the program what it is today.

The first version of the Applicant Guidebook was posted October 2008. The Applicant Guidebook documents how ICANN has implemented the GNSO policy recommendations and is a comprehensive guide for applicants on the program's requirements and evaluation process.

ICANN's Generic Names Supporting Organization (GNSO) conducted their policy development process between December 2005 and September 2007. This work produced a set of principles and recommendations on what should be included when implementing the program.

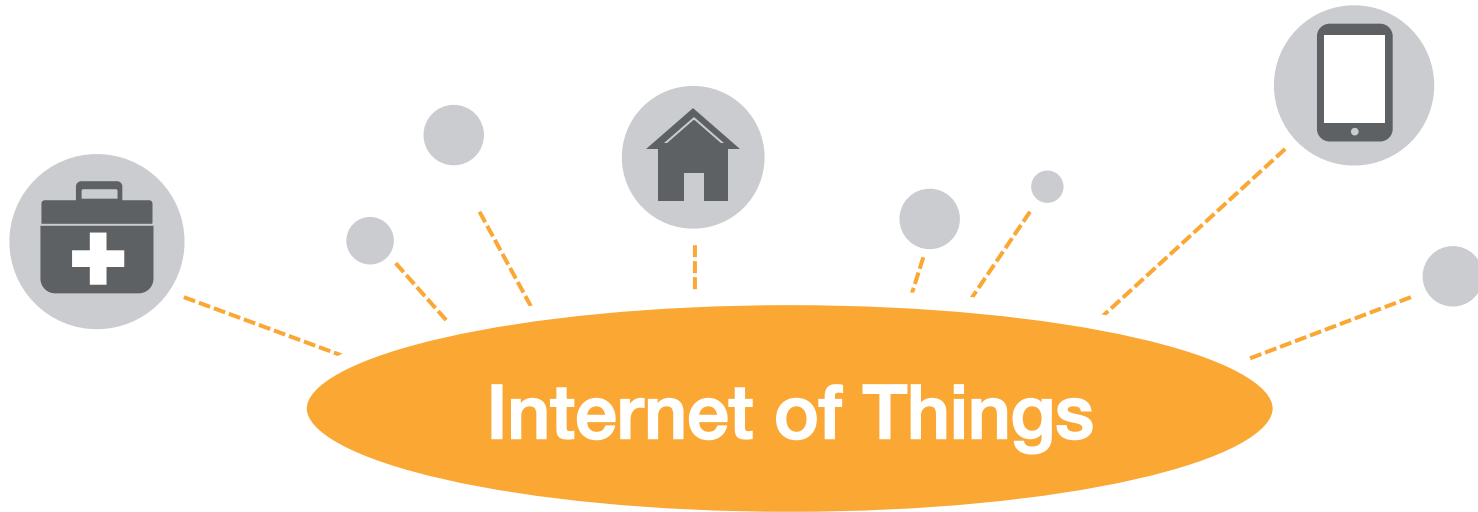

 - Addresses special characteristics of .BRAND owners
- + Improved Reporting: New gTLD Application Status

- + ICANN Global Domains Division Portal Launched
 - Streamline business interactions with ICANN
- + Enabling a multilingual Internet, increasing global reach
 - Assembling groups to define character sets for non-Latin script languages (e.g., Arabic, Chinese, Hindi)
- + Increasing Focus on Universal TLD Acceptance
- + Ongoing outreach to IT community on Name Collision
- + First New gTLD Program Auction expected in June 2014

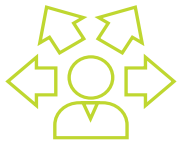

Non-native English speakers – For the first time, Internet users across the world will be able to engage online entirely in their native languages. This change will promote closer connections between people, brands and organisations and will in turn provide new routes of self-expression and innovation.

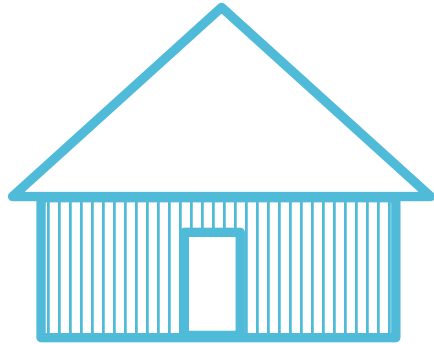
Examples



. [REGION]

Governments may begin to see gTLDs representing local municipalities and may be asked to provide support for geographic names. With the new domains, cities/regions will be able to offer residents and businesses the chance to create websites synonymous with where they live and operate.

In the non-profit sector you will see charities, social enterprises, companies and institutions all come together to better tap into the huge potential for building a better global society by engaging communities, increasing advocacy and building trust in what they're trying to achieve.

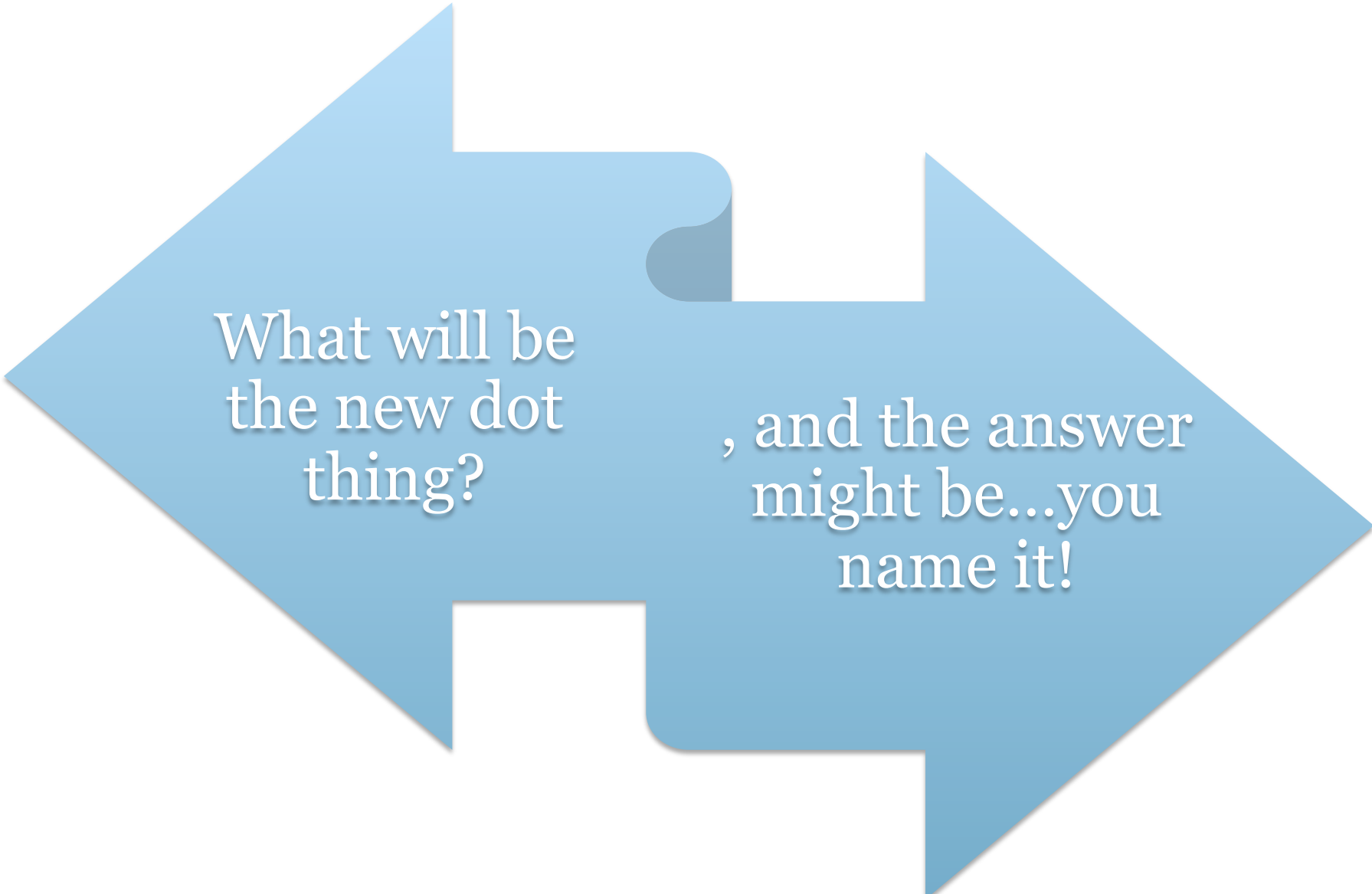
Uniform Rapid Suspension System
